The opportunity to participate in a secondment at Rogers Media Inc. is something that I had been interested in since I applied to Fasken. I have been a passionate sports fan since before I can remember, so joining the Business Affairs group to focus mainly on Sportsnet's business strategy and contract negotiations was exciting for me.

While seconded, I had the opportunity to contribute to a business strategy proposal, learn about the ins and outs of contract negotiation at the ground level, and contribute an article about hockey analytics to the Sportsnet website. I was grateful to have exposure to a variety of contracts that are foundational to the sports broadcasting industry. This summer, I had the unique opportunity to complete a secondment at the Workplace Safety and Insurance Appeals Tribunal (WSIAT). The WSIAT is an administrative tribunal that has exclusive jurisdiction to hear appeals from the Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB), as well as "right to sue" applications. Given my passion for both litigation and administrative law, I am extremely grateful to have been able to gain exposure and contribute to the work of the WSIAT—it was the perfect end to a wonderful summer.

While at the WSIAT, I was placed in the Tribunal Counsel Office (TCO). TCO provides legal advice to the other departments at the WSIAT and also provides neutral legal assistance in relation to the most complex legal and medical issues that arise in WSIAT appeals. I was personally given the chance to assist with these issues as a great deal of the research I completed revolved around procedural, public policy, and constitutional issues that had recently arisen in WSIAT appeals. I was also able to help with the review of several complex right to sue applications. The WSIAT's empowering legislation provides exclusive jurisdiction to the WSIAT to determine when a worker's "right to sue" is removed. This work was particularly interesting, in that it granted me great exposure to the interaction between administrative tribunals and the civil court system. Given my interest in administrative law, this was nothing short of fascinating.

Beyond the legal work itself, I must say that the TCO team of lawyers and Medical Liaison Office staff were steadfastly warm, welcoming, and supportive. I truly enjoyed every day at WSIAT, and I attribute this to the people with whom I was able to work just as much as I attribute it to the interesting nature of the work itself.

I spent the last four weeks of Fasken's summer program on secondment at Toronto International Film Festival Inc. (TIFF), a non-profit corporation that has organized and operated the world's most publicly attended film festival for over 40 years.

Working at TIFF was an incredible experience, as I had the opportunity to go behind-the-scenes and explore the various legal issues that impact the festival. In particular, I conducted research on trade-mark infringement in the context of ambush marketing, surveyed the possible legal responses to fraudulent advertising companies, and researched the requirements under privacy law for the use of data-sharing cookies. I also drafted a cease and desist letter that was sent to a company that used TIFF's logo without permission, and reviewed contracts from vendors that hope to operate during the festival.

In addition to the above tasks, I was encouraged to take advantage of the other services that TIFF offers. I did so by perusing the impressive collection of film memorabilia that TIFF stores in its Film Reference Library. Having the opportunity to engage in this extra-curricular activity allowed me to learn about the charitable work TIFF does beyond planning the festival, which includes sharing film culture with the broader public.

Overall, my secondment at TIFF provided me with a better understanding of the work conducted by an in-house legal team.
