# Mark Bowman - Metrolinx

This summer I had the pleasure of being seconded to the Office of the General Counsel and Corporate Secretary at Metrolinx, a Crown agency that oversees transportation solutions in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area. Metrolinx includes three operating divisions: GO Transit, Union Pearson Express, and PRESTO. Metrolinx is also currently implementing The Big Move, a bold transportation plan to build over 1,200 kilometres of rapid transit in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area.

This secondment offered insight into the everyday legal requirements that a large organization faces. Given the breadth and diversity of Metrolinx' operations, the legal department was very busy, allowing me to gain exposure to multiple operational areas. Supporting the legal department offered me the valuable opportunity to research issues surrounding legislative compliance, help draft software procurement documents, research and analyze information technology contract provisions, and support the legal team in software procurement negotiations. As a student hoping to practice information technology law, this was an incredible experience.

My secondment at Metrolinx was very rewarding. I would like to give sincere thanks to the Office of the General Counsel and Corporate Secretary as well as all of the other summer legal students and employees at Metrolinx who made my experience so fantastic. #### **Noel Chow - Manulife Financial**

I was fortunate enough to have spent 5 weeks of my summer on secondment with Manulife Financial. During my time there, I

was integrated into the Legal Department of Manulife Investments. While my work was predominantly related to Manulife's mutual funds and its obligations under Canadian securities legislation, I also had the luxury of collaborating with the company's other business areas such as the Insurance, Finance, and Tax groups on various firm-wide initiatives.

As the busy prospectus renewal season was approaching, I was able to contribute by assisting the in-house team with their draft reviews. Manulife offers a broad range of mutual funds for which disclosure documents such as Management Reports of Fund Performance (MRFPs), Fund Facts, and a Prospectus are required. My involvement in reviewing these documents taught me the importance of disclosing accurate and current information to protect investors, a main goal in securities law. While my securities course at school introduced me to securities legislation, my involvement with the actual preparation of various disclosure documents under Manulife Investment taught me how onerous complying with securities legislation in Ontario can be. A personal benefit I gained from my assistance with this ongoing project was learning about mutual funds, both from an investor's and seller's perspective.

My overall experience at Manulife far exceeded any expectations I had prior to my 'send-off'. The aspect I valued the most was that I became fully submersed into Manulife's legal group and had the pleasure of working with my colleagues at Fasken, but from the client's side. Having worked for Manulife, as a client of the firm, I now have a better understanding of the service and assistance Fasken provides to Manulife and can apply this understanding to any future work I do for Manulife as well as for the firm's other clients.

As a secondment student at the centre, I was encouraged to assist with all of the services that Law Help Ontario offers to its clients and it was an invaluable learning experience.

Throughout the four weeks, I was able to attend client meetings with the lawyers, draft court documents such as statements of defence, motion records, and affidavits, receive feedback on these documents from a lawyer at the centre, draft a new help guide on the topic of transferring court proceedings to a different county, assist individuals in navigating the administrative floor of the courthouse by accompanying them to the file room, the motion desks and helping them search the internal computers of

the courthouse, and provide assistance more generally throughout each day as issues arose.

#### Janna Young - equality effect

During the last four weeks of my summer experience at Fasken Martineau, I had the opportunity to be seconded to the equality effect. The equality effect is a human rights organization that uses the law in creative and innovative ways to address the human rights abuses suffered by women and girls internationally. The organization currently works in Ghana, Kenya and Malawi. I was fortunate enough to start my time at the equality effect in the wake of the "160 Girls" Victory. The legal victory made legal history; the 160 Girls from Meru, Kenya, with the vital help from the equality effect, won their Constitutional claim against the Kenyan government. Specifically, the decision of the Kenyan High Court established that the police, in failing to enforce defilement laws and in failing to protect girls from defilement, violated domestic, regional and international human rights laws.

My time during my secondment was spent researching legal avenues to implement the Kenyan High Court's "160 Girls" decision. The work required me to research publications and case law from a number of international jurisdictions, including the United States, England, India, and South Africa, in addition to Canada. Throughout my work at the equality effect, I consistently developed my legal research skills and was introduced to jurisprudence from a diversity of courts. Ultimately, I found that I had a great interest in the topic of the legal memorandum I produced.

I would like to thank Fiona Sampson of the equality effect for showing me what dedication, passion and commitment can achieve. It was incredibly inspiring to have the opportunity to meet and work alongside her. In addition, I would also like to extend a thank-you to the Professional Development Committee at Fasken Martineau for facilitating this opportunity.
